- Always ask if you can help coworkers do anything before you go home or before you go to lunch.
- Get involved in extra circular activities.

- Join a committee you might have an interest in. Look for opportunities to help in areas not your own. Be friendly. Attend all meetings and functions.
- Be on time to work, be dependable. Do the best work you can. Smile to and say hello to your co-workers. Try to be approachable, join in conversation if given an opportunity. Keep your work space clean and inviting. A few pictures or personal items are a good way for others to get to know you a little bit.
- Just be you, I say hi to everyone I come across. I offer to help out where I can. Share some fun things about yourself with some of your co-workers.
